Previously Incarcerated Hoosiers

Voting rights in Indiana are restored upon release from prison, and people on parole or probation can vote. Previously incarcerated people should check their registration and re-register to vote.

Recently Naturalized Citizens

Recently naturalized Americans have the same voting rights as someone who was born in the U.S.

Transgender People

Transgender people can vote, even if their gender does not match what is listed on their state-issued ID. Transgender Hoosiers must be registered with the name that is listed on their state-issued ID.

College Students

Students have a right to register and vote in the place they truly consider to be “home” — whether their dorm room, apartment, or parents’ house.

Individuals with Disabilities

Polling places must have an accessible voting machine. Voters that require assistance may designate a friend or receive assistance from a certified poll worker.

Unhoused Hoosiers

If you lack a permanent address because you are experiencing homelessness or live in a motor home, you can still vote.
